Times are changing, and so is the way we're educating our children. Our schools today have become increasingly diverse, along with their future goals and unique learning needs. Aurora Public Schools and the Cherry Creek School District collectively serve over 96,000 stu-

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dents. APS educates children speaking over 160 languages from over 130 countries, while students in CCSD speak over 130 languages from over 100 countries. While there may be some unique differences between the two districts, there are definitely some shared goals for educating today's learners. Today's students look forward to a world of work where many of their occupations don't yet exist! Students are exposed to many more options and choices when it comes to both course content and method

of delivery. Learning has become much more student-centered, and high school students have many opportunities to begin exploring potential career paths.

Both Aurora and Cherry Creek have championed programming to establish workforce readiness. Flexible scheduling and coursework have opened the doors for student internships, blended learning environments, and concurrent enrollment through local community colleges.

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Education Day

Members of the Leadership Aurora class visited the Community College of Aurora's Lowry Campus as part of our field experience for Education Day. The class was greeted by Dr. Betsy Oudenhoven, President of the Community College of Aurora, and also met with leaders from Colorado Technical University, and the Colorado Film School.

The Community College of Aurora serves students from all walks of life and enables them to become lifelong learners, while also preparing them for success in the workforce. CCA offers accredited online degree programs, certificate programs, a general education degree, transfer degree programs, and associate of arts and sciences programs. All these educational opportunities are designed to suit a wide variety of student needs and interests – both online and in the classroom. One unique aspect of CCA is ability to seamlessly transfer credits to other Colorado colleges and universities. On campus students can access the career resources office to assist in program selection and offer employment assistance and support as student begin their careers.

A unique opportunity that CCA offers is Colorado EMT training and certification or Colorado EMS training and certification. Using the most up-to-date technology, like high-tech mannequins, and simulated, real life experience, students receive invaluable hands-on learning for becoming an EMT or EMS. The elaborate training facilities on campus provide lifelike simulated experiences that students will encounter in the field.

CCA partners with local law enforcement and emergency responders to host periodic, multi-jurisdiction training simulations. Through these mock training sessions, our first responders gain valuable insights on how to best respond in a wide variety of emergency situations. They work to collaborate and share resources to best respond to large-scale emergency events.

Another specialized opportunity for students is its business incubator. CCA's Entrepreneur Space is a dedicated on-campus work space that is outfitted with the latest equipment to support the launch and growth of a new small business. Students studying entrepreneurship and small business management have access to many resources that offset many of the costs of starting a new business. The CCA Launchpad is equipped with computer work stations for business planning, the development of marketing materials, 3D modeling software and equipment to help with product prototyping, and each computer station has Quickbooks financial management software to help students manage revenues and expenses in the first months of operation. The Launchpad houses many of the tools necessary to engage in all aspects of business including copiers and office tools to help entrepreneurs put their best foot forward in the marketplace. This space is also used for collaborative opportunities allowing budding entrepreneurs to bounce ideas off of one-another and to leverage each other's skills and abilities to support their peer ventures. This space was designed to be used as a fully functioning business office for new businesses to become established and gain the necessary momentum to become self-sufficient once they emerge from the incubator.

Colorado Technical University offers both associate and bachelor's degrees in addition to graduate programs allowing students to earn both master's and doctoral degrees. CTU has been repeatedly recognized as one of the most "military friendly" schools in the country. CTU allows students to earn prior learning credits for a variety of life and career experiences, making their programs attractive and their degrees attainable. Courses can be completed both on campus, online, and through blended learning opportunities.

The Colorado film school offers a variety of certificates and degrees in a rigorous professional training environment. All students begin with a set of core courses that prepare a foundational understanding across all disciplines of filmmaking, encouraging a deeper understanding of the entire film making process. Students can earn certificates or an associate of applied science degree in one of six areas of emphasis: screenwriting, producing, directing, acting, cinematography, and postproduction. All students engage in the filmmaking process from start to finish through real life projects. Students who complete the program build a professional level portfolio and are qualified to either work anywhere in the field of their chosen emphasis or continue their education in a graduate program.

Where we have been...

Aurora History Museum:

Located within the City of Aurora Municipal Center, the Aurora History Museum opened its doors in 1979. The museum collects and exhibits artifacts and documents pertaining to the history of Aurora and Colorado.

Currently the museum has several temporary exhibits:

Wings to Satellites – A History of Buckley Air Force Base

This Exhibit, open now through June 3rd, features stories surrounding



Buckley Air Force Base over the past eight decades. The Exhibit includes historical Buckley newspapers, "letters from loved ones", various uniforms worn by those at Buckley and overseas, and additional information highlighting the Colorado Armed National Guard as well as Buckley's commitment and sacrifices made to protect our Citizens. Several facets of the Exhibit detail out what it is like to be a "rookie", as well as train at the Base.

US 40 and the American Road Trip

This Exhibit, open now through May 6th, highlights the history of Colfax Avenue, original Aurora historic sites and changes seen over the years.

Changing the Face of Education

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Aurora Public Schools is home to Pickens Technical College. Pickens is a nonprofit, public institution that has over 30 CTE (Career and Technical Education) programs, where students learn theory and then apply what they learn in a classroom, lab, outdoor or shop setting. Today's highly technical and advanced classes are designed to be both exploratory in nature and focused toward program completion and certification. Pickens is proud of their industry partnerships, allowing students to gain hands-on experience with the newest technology available. Pickens serves both secondary and post-secondary students at about a 50/50% split. The secondary students are comprised of Aurora Public Schools and other school districts who have contracts with Pickens. Pickens is very focused on student success, so instructors, administration, the career services department and their many partnered employers all work together to assist the students with careers readiness and job placement.

Pickens is a total participation school when it comes to their Career and Technical Student Organizations, so every student has the opportunity to participate in volunteer work, fundraising, toy, food and hygiene drives, and compete in events at regional, state, and national levels. Students at Pickens can earn critical industry certifications and digital badges that translate into immediate workforce readiness.

The Cherry Creek School District offers career and technical courses in every high school. Construction is underway on a new state-of-the-art facility where students will be able to take highly technical courses in advanced manufacturing, aviation, business services, culinary and hospitality, health services, infrastructure engineering, information technology and computer



systems, and transportation. The district's Career and Technical Education program connects students with unique opportunities that offer access to the next generation of careers in a variety of fields. Students have the opportunity to complete internships, earn college credit, and earn critical industry certifications and digital badges. The Cherry Creek Schools Foundation has worked diligently with the CTE program to establish industry partners to help expand programming and provide the latest tools and technology for students to gain hands-on experience.
